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1 INTRODUCTION

In order to develop human resources that will be capable of manage the area of interests in the European Horse Sector an initiative to create an “European Master in Equine Science” was taken within the Commission on Horse Production of the organisation of European Federation of Animal Science (EAAP) at the Workshop of Equine Education at the EAAP meeting in Lithuania 2008.

Since EAAP organisation has not the status as university an EAAP European Equine Master cannot be issued. Instead there is now an idea about an “European Master Certificate in Equine Science” that will support an EU Master Degree in Equine Sciences. The idea is to create structure of collaboration between universities in countries that are members in European Federation of Animal Science (EAAP). Other universities can be invited.

Discussions about the structure of the program bring a new idea of organization of education within the EAAP. The reason is that so many Universities are not suitable to execute the common Syllabus through official procedures. The idea from meeting within 61th EAAP annual meeting is that EAAP can grant diplomas. The EAAP can promote such diplomas and each partner can ask for notification of diploma in home university.

The education is of big importance in a national and international context because it develops human resources that will be capable of:

- understanding, interpreting and carrying out scientific research,
- educational and technical work in the field of horse industry in connection with modern agriculture and society,
- mobility within Europe and networking across borders

In order to make it possible for students all over Europe to have information and contact data about higher education in Equine Science a proposal was made by the Working Group for Equine Science Education, EAAP Horse Commission, to create a network amongst European Universities in countries connected to EAAP. Universities connected to the network offering programs/courses/modules in Equine Science should constitute the basic structure for merging information about programs/courses/ modules given in Equine Science Education at university level in Europe.

The data base as ‘Bag of knowledge’ was created to:

- working group get a picture of present situation in partner countries
- support decision of possible forms of curriculum and
- be useful for completing the syllabus for each partner when start education

The idea about this is that students in each country could search for equine courses/modules at master level at universities all over Europe.

The student and his/her study director can use the information in the “knowledge bag” to merge courses into a suggestion of a study plan to be approved by their home university in order to attain a Master Degree in Equine Science Education in collaboration with one, two or more universities. This can be obtained by agreements between universities.

The aim of this certificate in Master studies encompassing 120 ECTS awarded by member universities is to support the students and universities with a structure, validating body and administration in order to increase international acceptance and surplus value.

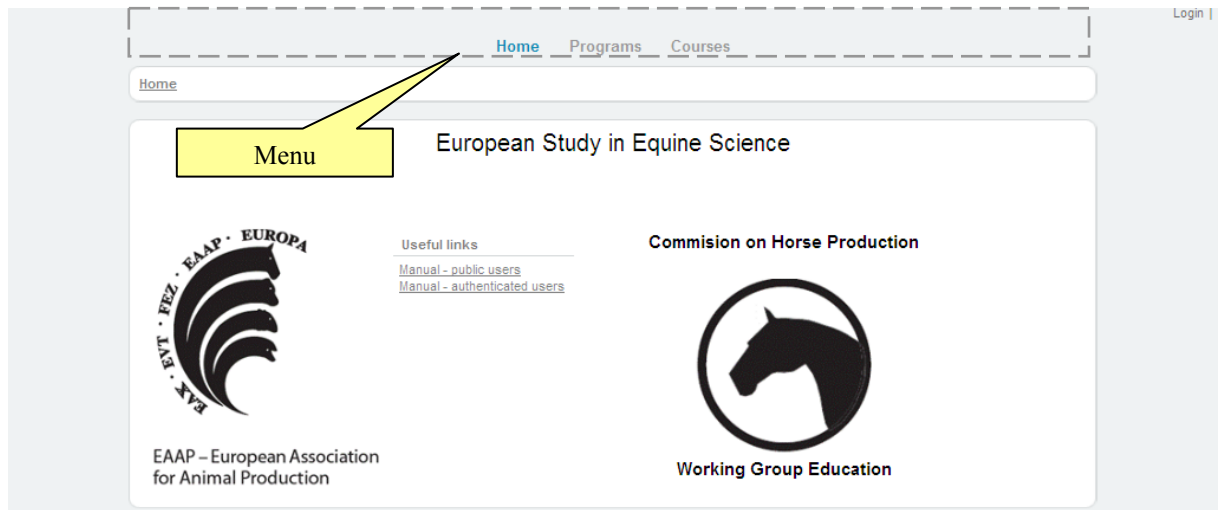


Figure 1: Menu

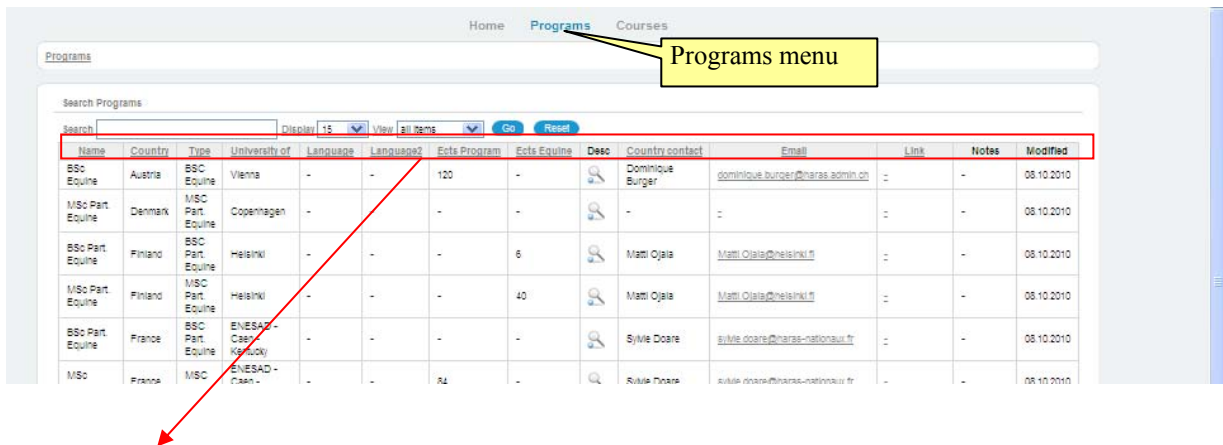


Figure 2: Programs menu
